- 2) To produce materials and resources to support the mentors involved.
- 3) To produce materials and resources for adult learning organisations to support volunteer mentors working with adult learners.
- 4) To develop a European peer mentoring network through the partnership work of the mobilities to support partner/country networks.

PROGRESS OF THE PROJECT

The Project's first task was a survey and analysis of whether mentoring would support adult returners to learning. We started in February 2013 with this questionnaire, which targeted adults, within and outside our institutions, for their views on support and mentoring. The questionnaires were first created and then the agreed questionnaires were distributed to a range of adults. After their completion data were collected and subsequently analysed.

We aimed for 500 responses (100 per partner country) with the questionnaire going out in each partner's native language. We questioned potential volunteer mentors, other adults in our organisations and former adult students who have continued in further education to identify the ways in which we best supported them when they returned to education. The aim of this research was to determine what they view as important support and whether they would themselves like to participate in adult education as volunteer mentors.

Final number of questionnaires exceeded the expected number by 27.4 %, reality: 637 questionnaires and many of the participants in the questionnaire survey are interested in

supporting and mentoring. Their interest was greater than we expected because 25% of them noted an interest in mentoring.
